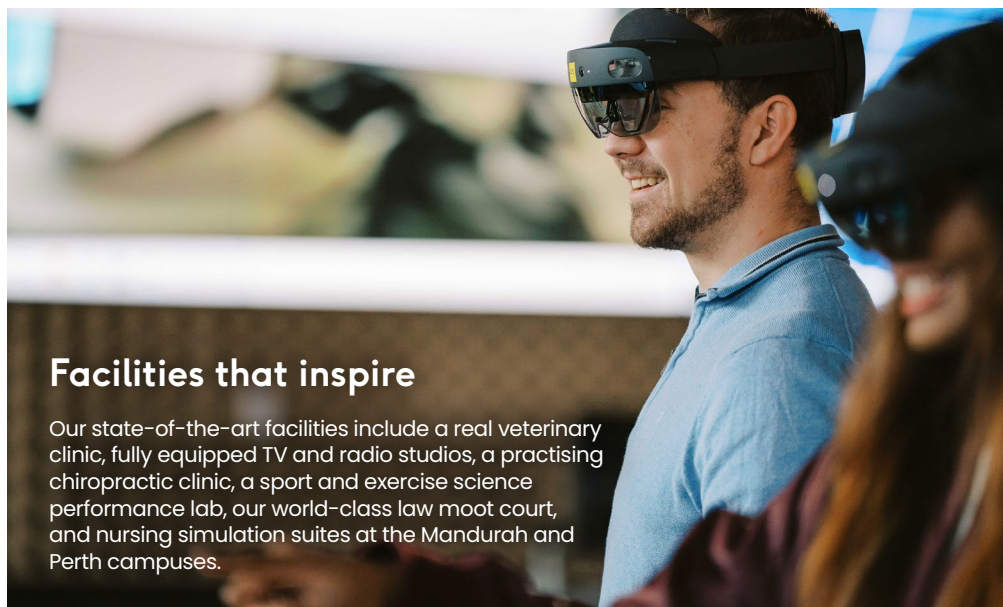

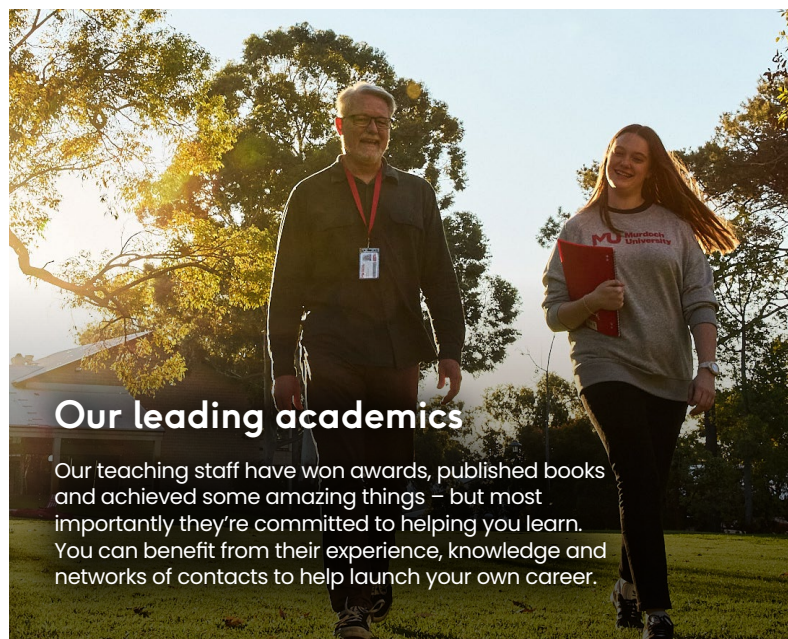

# Pathways to Murdoch

We have a range of pathway options available, taking into account your high school results, previous studies, and work and life experience.

Enrolling into university is a big decision, especially if you are unsure whether you'll meet the admission requirements. The first thing you need to do is find out which of our admission pathways you are eligible for, and how they work.

To study at Murdoch University, you will need to meet the specific academic and English Language Competency (ELC) requirements for your course. For the majority of our undergraduate courses, domestic students can demonstrate ELC by satisfying **one** of the following requirements:

- Successfully completing Year 11 and 12, or 2 years of VET (TAFE/RTO) study
- Achieving a scaled mark of 50 or higher in ATAR English, Literature or English as an Additional Language or Dialect
- Sitting an English proficiency test, such as the Skills for Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT)
- Successfully completing a University Tertiary Preparation Endorsed Program or enabling course
- Successfully completing a Diploma (AQF Level 5 or higher)
- Successfully completing two units at an Australian university or through Open Universities Australia (AQF Level 7 or higher).

Some courses such as Nursing, Engineering, Law and Veterinary Science, as well as some combined degrees have higher ATAR or ELC requirements. If you'd like to study one of these courses but don't currently meet the entry requirements, read more on page 8 to find out what pathway you can take to study your course of interest.

For some of our admission pathways, we will need to consider your extracurricular activities, previous studies, and work or life experience.

# Pathways for school leavers

Undergraduate courses at Murdoch University have a guaranteed selection rank required for consideration, with the exception of Nursing and Veterinary Science (which have a competitive entry).

Your selection rank for university entry can be generated by a range of qualifications like an ATAR, other Year 12 academic programs, vocational qualifications, a portfolio, or completion of an enabling course. You'll find the minimum selection rank for the courses you're interested in by visiting [www.murdoch.edu.au/study](http://www.murdoch.edu.au/study)

## Academic and English Language Competency (ELC) requirements

To gain admission into a course at Murdoch University, a selection rank of 70 or higher (depending on your chosen course) is required and you need to meet our English Language Competency (ELC) requirements.

The most common ways for a domestic student to meet ELC requirements are:

- Successfully completing Year 11 and 12 (or an equivalent program approved by the Department of Education Western Australia) or two years of VET (TAFE/RTO) study delivered in English in an Australian school or provider; or
- A minimum scaled score of 50 or higher in ATAR English (or equivalent), or;
- A score of 140, or higher in the Written English Component of the Skills for Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT).

Education, Law, Veterinary Science, Nursing, Lab Medicine, Forensic Science, Biomedical Science and Food Science have different academic and/or ELC requirements. See page 8 for further details.

## Selection criteria

The majority of courses at Murdoch University require a selection rank of 70. This can be achieved by:

- Attaining an adjusted or unadjusted ATAR,
- Scoring 24 in the International Baccalaureate (IB),
- Completing an accredited Certificate IV or higher,
- Submitting a successful Experience Based Entry or Media Portfolio application, or
- Successfully completing a university enabling pathway course. Read more about our enabling pathway courses on pages 10-13.

If you completed high school outside of Western Australia, you will still need to meet the same entry requirements as Western Australian students. ATAR scores are equivalent across every state in Australia. If you have previously studied in Queensland and have an Overall Position (OP), you can have this converted to an ATAR score.

## International Baccalaureate

Your International Baccalaureate can be converted into an ATAR equivalent (for example, 24 IB is equivalent to a 70 ATAR). You can find the International Baccalaureate score for the courses you're interested in on our online course finder.

## International Big Picture Learning Credential (IBPLC)

We are the only Western Australian university to offer entry via the International Big Picture Learning Credential for

students attaining a minimum of three Level 4s and two Level 3s. Your IBPLC can be used to assess eligibility for entry into a wide range of courses. Your best five out of the six possible credential levels will be converted to a selection rank. When you apply, upload your IBPLC to enable the confirmation of your levels and, if necessary, to enable your e-portfolio to be assessed.

## The difference between ATAR and selection rank

Your ATAR, or Australian Tertiary Admission Rank, is a number between 0 and 99.95 – a rank which tells you how you've been positioned compared to other Year 12 students in Western Australia.

Adjustments are used to increase your selection rank. You can receive an adjustment for completing a language other than English, Mathematics Specialist ATAR, or Mathematics Methods ATAR. Additionally, at Murdoch University we have our 'RISE' program, an educational access scheme aimed at supporting access to university for ATAR students from regional, low socio-economic, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander backgrounds, or who are the first in their family to attend university.

It can help you get into your preferred course by increasing your Murdoch University selection rank. There's no need to register – if you're eligible for RISE, the adjustment factor is automatically added to your ATAR score when you apply for a Murdoch University undergraduate degree.

## Other admission options

Some of our courses allow for admission pathways whereby students can demonstrate a keen interest or achievement in an area related to their chosen course of study. These include:

### Enabling Programs: OnTrack Sprint, OnTrack Flex and K-Track

Murdoch University has three distinct enabling programs you can study after Year 12 to meet entrance into Murdoch University. These programs introduce you to undergraduate study and prepare you to transition into your degree. Find out more about our enabling programs, OnTrack Sprint, OnTrack Flex, and K-Track on page 10.

### Experience Based Entry

Our Experience Based Entry pathway considers your academic results alongside work, volunteering, leadership, and other life experiences. This option is available regardless of whether you are a high school leaver or over the age of 20. See page 16 for more information.

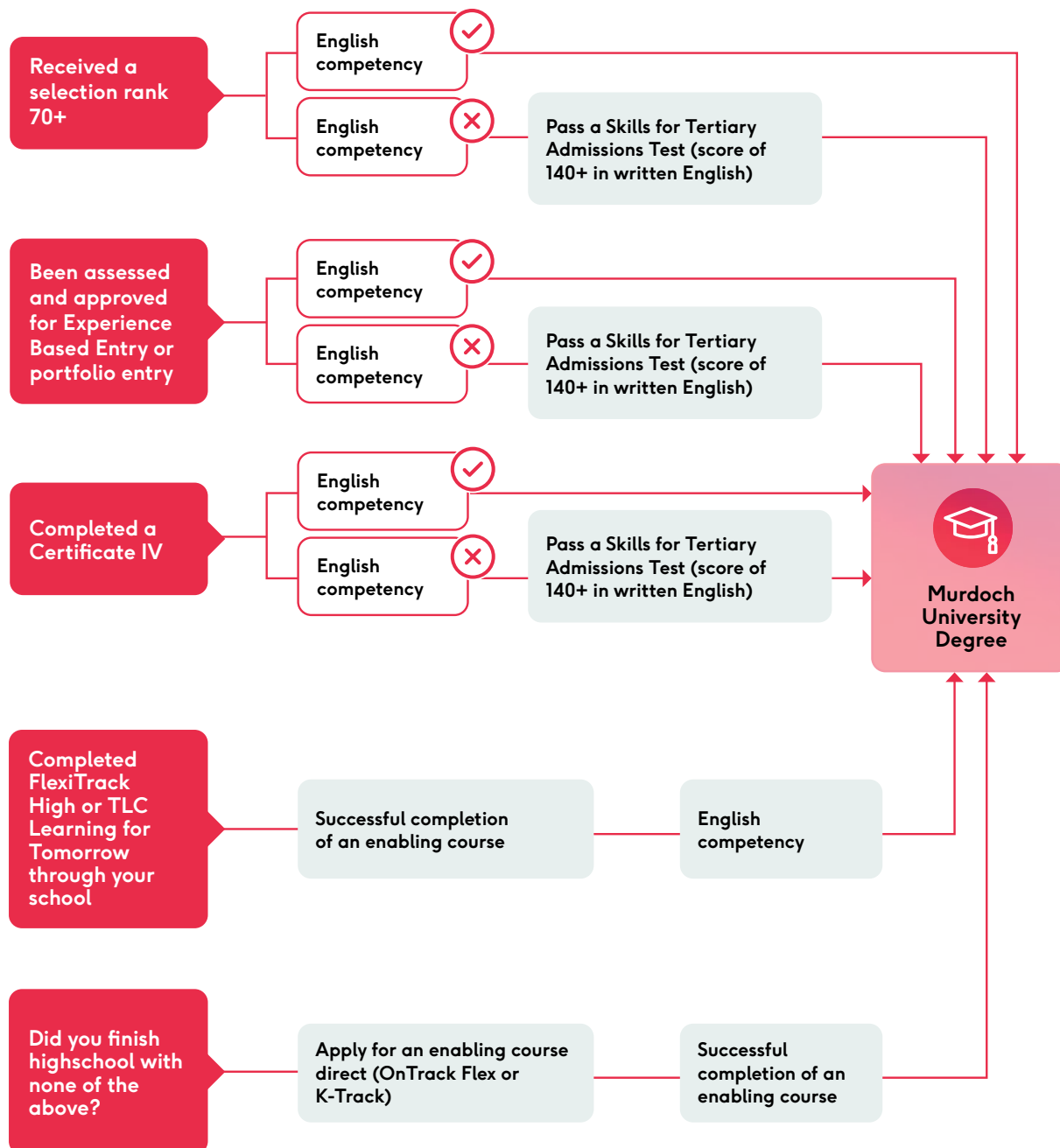
### Media Portfolio Pathway

Our Media Portfolio Pathway allows creative students to enter some of our Arts, Creative Media and Communication courses based on motivation and creative potential rather than ATAR results. You will submit a portfolio of relevant work, which is assessed by the Academic Chair for your desired course. See page 18 for more information.


### Law Pathways

Our Law pathways, including Pre-Law and Law Start, provide alternative entry options for students who do not meet traditional admission requirements. These pathways allow you to demonstrate your potential and gain entry into the Bachelor of Laws. See page 24 for more information.

# Pathways for non-school leavers

## If you completed high school more than two years ago

Even if you finished Year 12 a while ago, your exam results are still valid. If you finished in 1992 or after, you can visit [tisc.edu.au](http://tisc.edu.au) to convert your results to an ATAR using the TISC ATAR calculator. If you graduated high school prior to 1992, you can contact TISC directly to request an ATAR conversion based on historical results.

To apply for admission into most of our undergraduate courses, you will need a selection rank of 70 or higher (depending on your chosen course) and you will need to meet our English Language Competency (ELC) requirements.

## If you have work or life experience

If you didn't finish high school or haven't completed any tertiary education, there are still a range of admission pathway options to study at Murdoch University.

### Skills for Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT)

If you're at least 20 years old by the first of March in the year you wish to commence your studies, you can apply for entry to Murdoch University by sitting the STAT. You will be able to apply for all courses, excluding Law and Veterinary Science, using your STAT score.

To apply for admission into most of our undergraduate courses with minimum ELC, you'll need a STAT score of at least 140 in the written English section and 135 in the multiple choice section. To find out the ELC requirements, review the course pages on our website.

### Mature Age Pathway (MAP)

If you do not meet the academic entry requirements but have relevant work or life experience, our Mature Age Pathway may provide an alternative entry option. You will complete an interview and submit a portfolio including a resume, personal statement, and references. See page 15 for more information.

### Enabling Programs

Non-school leavers may be eligible for our OnTrack Flex or K-Track enabling programs. These programs introduce you to undergraduate study and prepare you to transition into your degree. See page 10-11 for more information.

### Experience Based Entry

Our Experience Based Entry pathway considers your academic results alongside work, volunteering, leadership, and other life experiences. This option is available regardless of whether you are a high school leaver or over the age of 20. See page 16 for more information.

### Media Portfolio Pathway

Our Media Portfolio Pathway allows creative students to enter an arts course based on motivation and creative potential rather than ATAR results. You will submit a portfolio of relevant work, which is assessed by the Academic Chair for your desired course. See page 18 for more information.

## If you have completed a vocational education and training qualification

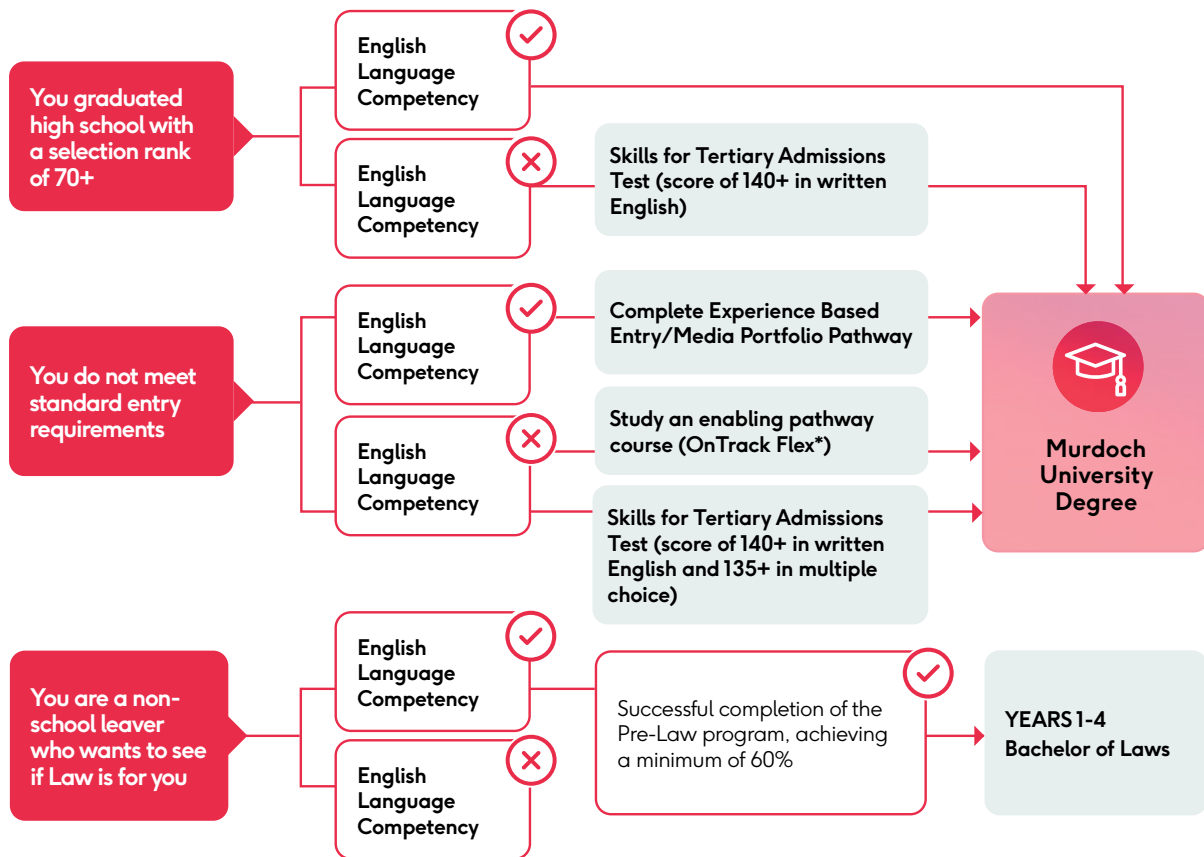
If you have successfully completed a Certificate IV or higher VET (TAFE/RTO) qualification and meet our English Language Competency (ELC) requirements, you're eligible to apply for admission to many of our undergraduate courses requiring a selection rank of 70. If you wish to enter into a higher selection requirement course please visit page 14.

## If you have previously commenced or completed study with a higher education provider

For most of our undergraduate courses, if you have successfully completed at least two units at an Australian university or through Open Universities Australia, you'll meet the entry requirements to apply for admission to courses requiring a selection rank of 70.

To be eligible for entry via this pathway for a course with a higher selection rank, you will need to have studied for one or two semesters full-time (depending on the Murdoch University course you choose) at another Australian university and achieve a minimum average score (minimum score dependent on the course you choose).

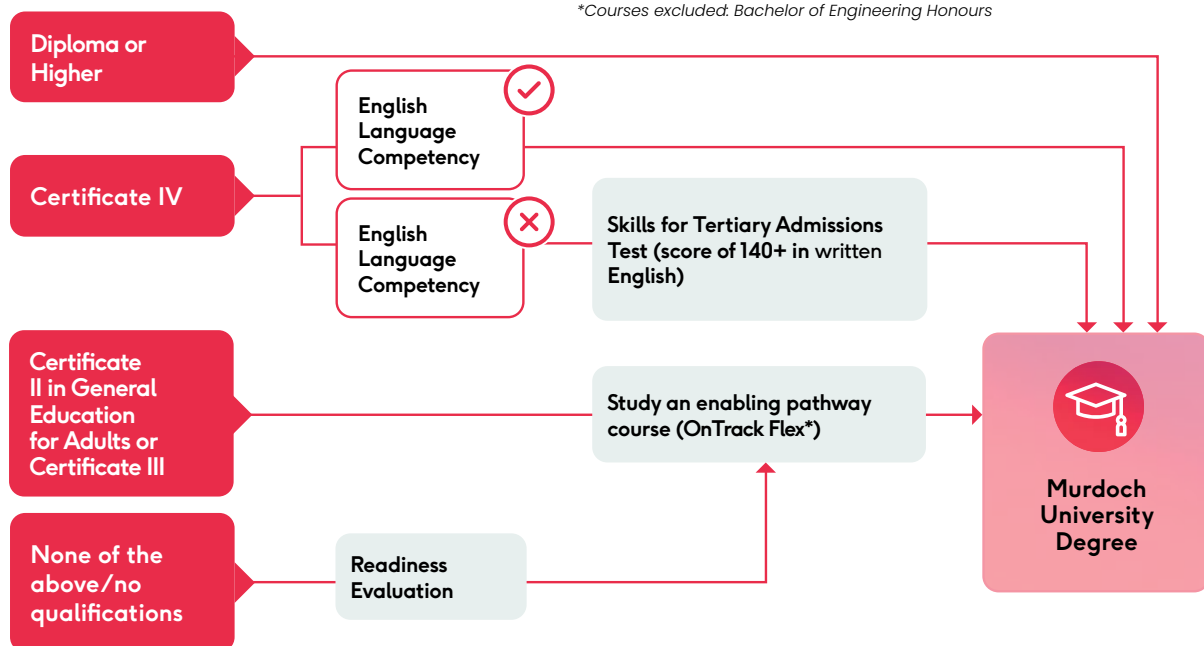

**Please note:** You will only be eligible for Murdoch University courses that you meet the entry requirements for, as some courses have higher entry requirements or additional ELC requirements. A readiness evaluation will need to be completed prior to studying an enabling program if the applicant has no formal qualifications. \*On successful completion of OnTrack Flex, you can only progress into a Selection Rank 70 course.

# Higher entry requirements

## Courses with higher entry requirements

Some Murdoch University courses such as Nursing, Engineering, Law and Veterinary Science, as well as some combined degrees have higher academic and/or English Language Competency (ELC) requirements than other Murdoch University courses. If you'd like to study one of these courses but don't meet the English Language Competency requirements, you may need to sit an English proficiency test such as the STAT or IELTS. All students seeking entry to Veterinary Science at Murdoch University must also undertake the Casper situational judgement assessment. If you do not meet academic entry requirements, you may need to consider another admission pathway such as studying an enabling pathway course or applying for another course in a similar field with lower entry requirements and then transferring after one or two semesters of successful study.

Other courses, including the Bachelor of Laboratory Medicine and Bachelor of Sport and Exercise Science/ Masters of Clinical Exercise Physiology, have specific entry requirements that need to be met to progress into the year of Masters level study. As these are competitive courses, you'll need a minimum grade point average (GPA) of 2.0 to progress to your fourth year.

## Veterinary Science

We offer several pathways for students seeking entry into the Bachelor of Science/Doctor of Veterinary Medicine, including pathways for school leavers, students with prior university study, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander applicants. Each pathway has its own eligibility criteria and assessment requirements. See pages 22-23 for more information.

## Engineering (Honours)

If you successfully complete 1 year of Engineering Technology, you can apply to transfer to Years 2-4 of the Bachelor of Engineering (Honours).

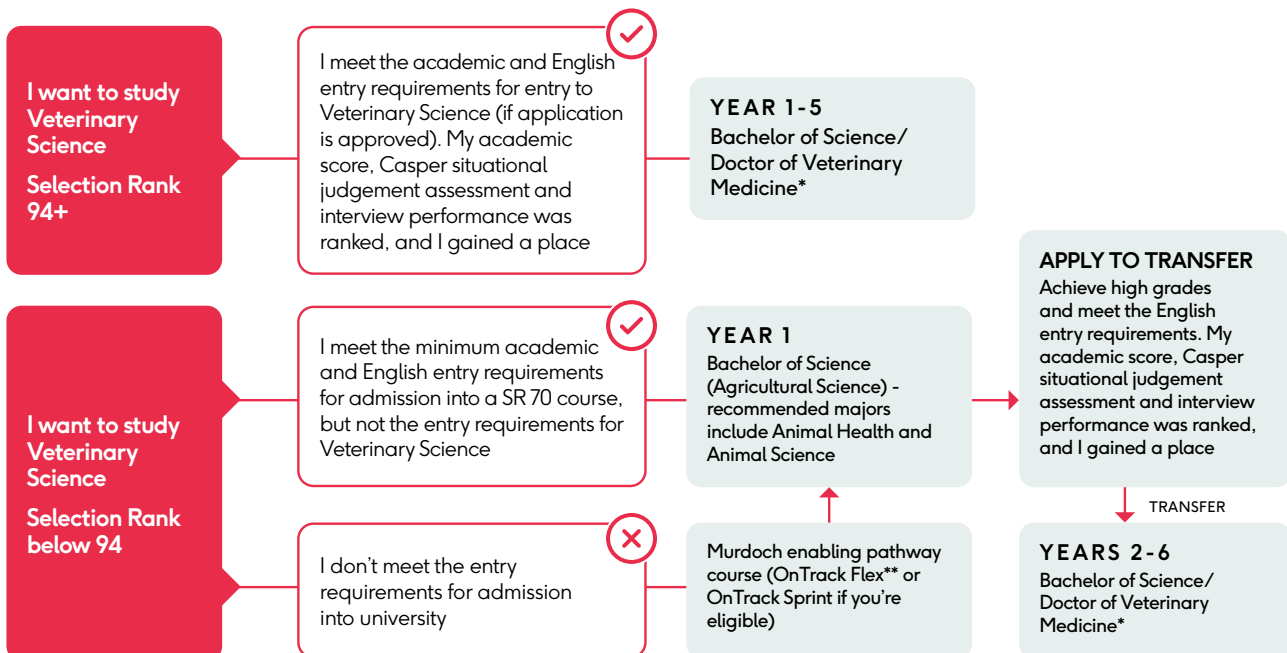
## Law Pathways

We have two alternative pathways for students seeking entry into law: Law Start and Pre-Law.

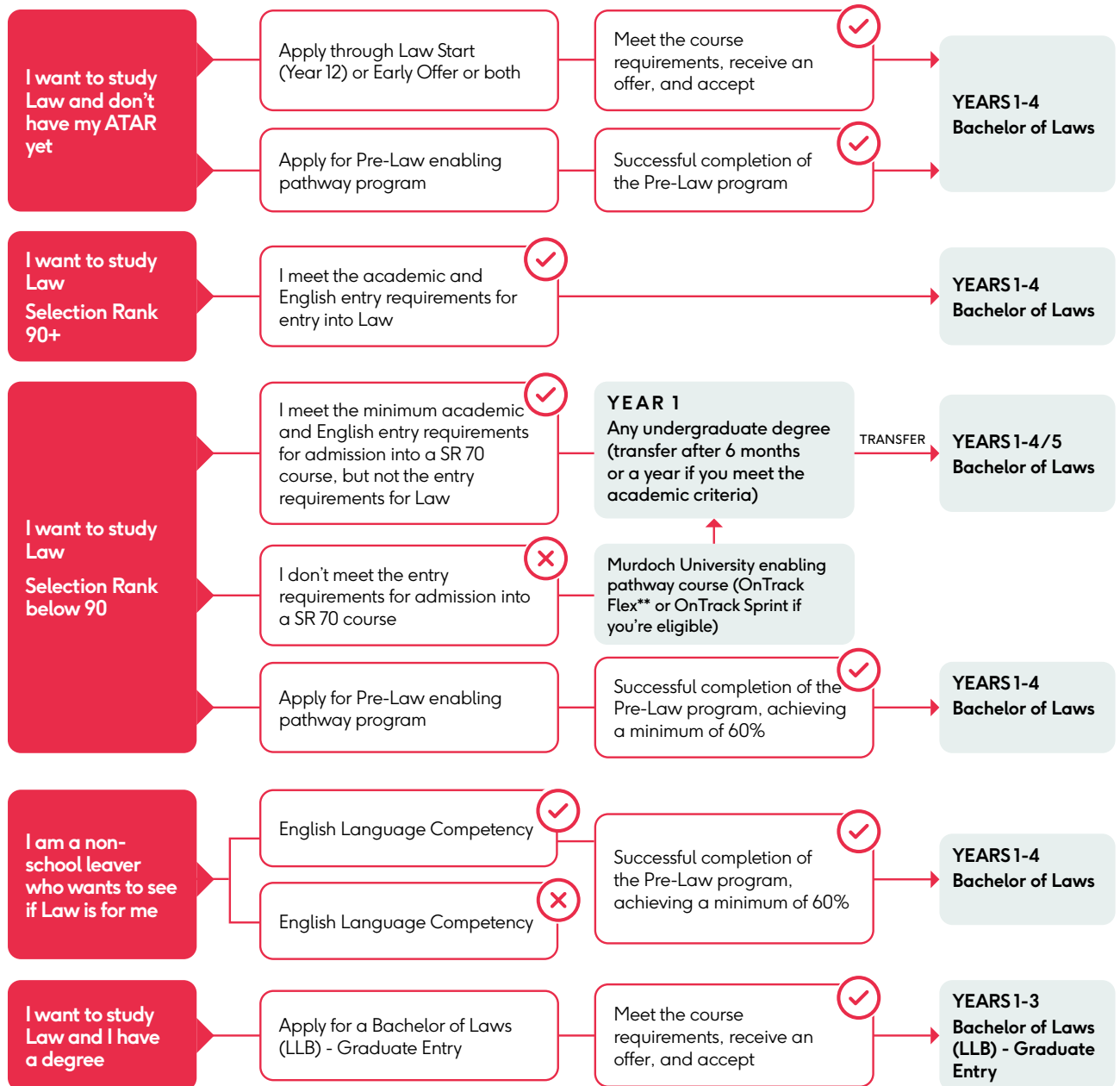
Law Start is for school leavers who have achieved strong results in one or more ATAR subjects, with a focus on essay writing and communication.

Pre-Law is an evening course for school leavers and non-school leavers who do not meet standard entry requirements. Complete the course at Credit level (60% or higher) to gain direct entry into the Bachelor of Laws. See pages 24-25 for more information.

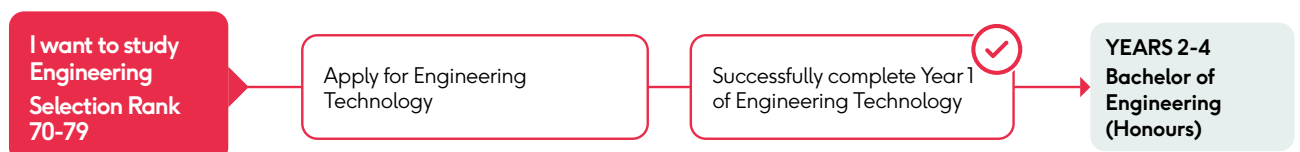

## Readiness evaluation

If you don't meet the entry requirements for OnTrack Flex, you'll be invited to sit our readiness evaluation – a custom designed tool that will help us assess your literacy and numeracy skills to determine whether you are ready to learn and study at a university level.

Prepare yourself for future university study through our free, supportive program, designed to simulate university study in an adult learning environment. Upon successful completion of OnTrack Flex you will receive a selection rank of 70 and meet the English language requirements into most Murdoch University bachelor degrees. The Bachelor of Nursing requires additional English language requirements.

  - Completion of Year 11 and 12
  - Two years VET (TAFE/RTO) in Australia
  - Have successfully completed a Certificate III in any program
  - Obtained a Certificate II in General Education for Adults

OnTrack Sprint is a free intensive 4-week program, designed for students who have recently completed Year 12 and aspire to complete a university degree but do not qualify for direct entry into Murdoch University. The program is taught without disruption in January to ensure you receive an offer for Semester 1 of that year. Upon successful completion of OnTrack Sprint, you will receive a selection rank of 70 and meet the English language requirements into most Murdoch University bachelor degrees. This pathway is not suitable for students wishing to study the Bachelor of Nursing.

#### What you'll learn:

- Develop effective study and learning habits
- Develop your academic skills to an undergraduate level
- Referencing and time management
- University lingo

#### Entry requirements

1. Be an Australian or New Zealand citizen, or hold a Permanent Residency or Humanitarian Visa
2. Completed Year 12 studies in the previous 18 months
3. Meet one of the following criteria:
  - Near-miss ATAR student who received an ATAR between 60 and 69.95
  - A student who has achieved an 'A' or 'B' grade average in General Subjects in Year 12
  - A student who has not undertaken a full suite of ATAR subjects but may have performed well in 2 or 3 subjects and is not applying via the Experience Based Entry pathway
  - A student who has demonstrated academic potential but may have had a disrupted Year 12 and is recommended for the program by their school

K-Track is our free 15-week program designed to enable Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander students to qualify for entry into an undergraduate degree. The program is taught by our staff at our Kulbardi Aboriginal Centre. Upon successful completion of K-Track, you will receive a selection rank of 70 and meet the English language requirements into most Murdoch University bachelor degrees.

#### What you'll learn:

- Explore the concepts of communication
- Explore collaborative work practices and critical thinking
- Introduction to academic writing styles and referencing
- Introduction to essay writing and constructing arguments

If you're approaching Year 12 and are not guaranteed an ATAR but want to study at Murdoch University, FlexiTrack High could be the perfect option for you. The program is taught in partner high schools like a standard high-school class that is included in your timetable. Upon successful completion of FlexiTrack High, you will receive a selection rank of 70.

#### What you'll learn:

- Develop the skills needed to succeed at university
- Identify, locate and use academic sources
- Summarise and critically analyse academic texts
- Apply foundational mathematics to solve problems and interpret data
- Construct an academic text in accordance with academic conventions

#### Entry requirements

1. Be an Australian or New Zealand citizen, or hold a Permanent Residency or Humanitarian Visa.
2. Current Year 11 student studying at a partner school who meet the following criteria:
  - Completing Year 12 at a partner school
  - Undertaking three or less ATAR subjects
  - Scoring a 'B' grade or higher in General English or a 'D' or higher in ATAR English or English Literature in Year 11

# Vocational Education and Training pathway



If you can demonstrate English Language Competency (ELC) and your VET (TAFE/RTO) qualification is a Certificate IV or higher, you could be eligible to start your undergraduate degree sooner than you think.

<b>Diploma or higher</b>	Non-school Leavers can apply direct to Murdoch University, however school leavers applying for Semester 1 must apply via TISC.
<b>Certificate IV with ELC</b>	Non-school Leavers can apply direct to Murdoch University, however school leavers applying for Semester 1 must apply via TISC.
<b>Certificate IV without ELC</b>	Sit the Skills for Tertiary Admissions Test (written section only) and if you achieve a score of 140+ in written English, you can then apply direct to Murdoch University.
<b>Certificate III</b>	Study our OnTrack Flex enabling course, and following successful completion, you can apply direct to Murdoch University.
<b>Certificate II in General Education for Adults</b>	Study our OnTrack Flex enabling course, and following successful completion, you can apply direct to Murdoch University.
<b>Certificate I or II</b>	Complete our readiness evaluation before studying our OnTrack Flex enabling course, and following successful completion, you can apply direct to Murdoch University.

# Mature Age Pathway

If you don't meet the academic entry requirements but have relevant work and life experience for the undergraduate course you're interested in, our Mature Age Pathway (MAP) could be for you.

## Application requirements

Apply directly to Murdoch University. To be considered for a course via this pathway, you will need to submit the following documentation:

- A completed **Mature Age Pathway** application form.
- A completed **Personal Statement** (approximately 500 words) explaining why you wish to study this course and how your past study and experience will help you succeed.
- A recent **resume** demonstrating 3–5 years of professional experience (paid or voluntary) in an area directly related to your chosen course. Applications for the Mature Age Pathway must be submitted at least two weeks prior to the start of semester.
- This pathway is not available for some courses, including Veterinary Science, Nursing, Engineering (Honours), Law, Bachelor of Health Science/Master of Clinical Chiropractic, and selected combined courses.

# Experience Based Entry

If you're a domestic student and haven't met a selection rank of 70 via academic ATAR or IB scores, AQF qualifications, or enabling programs, then regardless of whether you are a high school leaver or over the age of 20, our Experience Based Entry (EBE) could be the ideal option for you.

Experience Based Entry assesses your **academic, vocational, and life achievements in combination**. We take into consideration evidence of extracurricular and life experiences, such as employment, volunteering, work experience, sports coaching, and school and community leadership, as these are strong indicators of your interests, motivation, commitment, and desire to succeed and contribute.

## High school leavers

### Academic requirements

High school leavers will be required to attain a minimum of 3 points for academic attainment for their application to proceed.

The minimum requirements to attain 3 points are:

- Passes in 3 ATAR subjects, or 'B' grades in 3 General subjects, or a combination of both. For example, a pass in 1 x ATAR subject and 2 x 'B' grades in General subjects.
- An accredited Cert III may be used in lieu of one of the above, for example 1 ATAR subject, 1 'B' grade in a General subject, and a Cert III.
- A combination of any of the above will meet the minimum academic points required. See below.

### Experience requirements

High school leavers will be required to attain at least 1 point for evidenced extracurricular/life experience. Points can be awarded for:

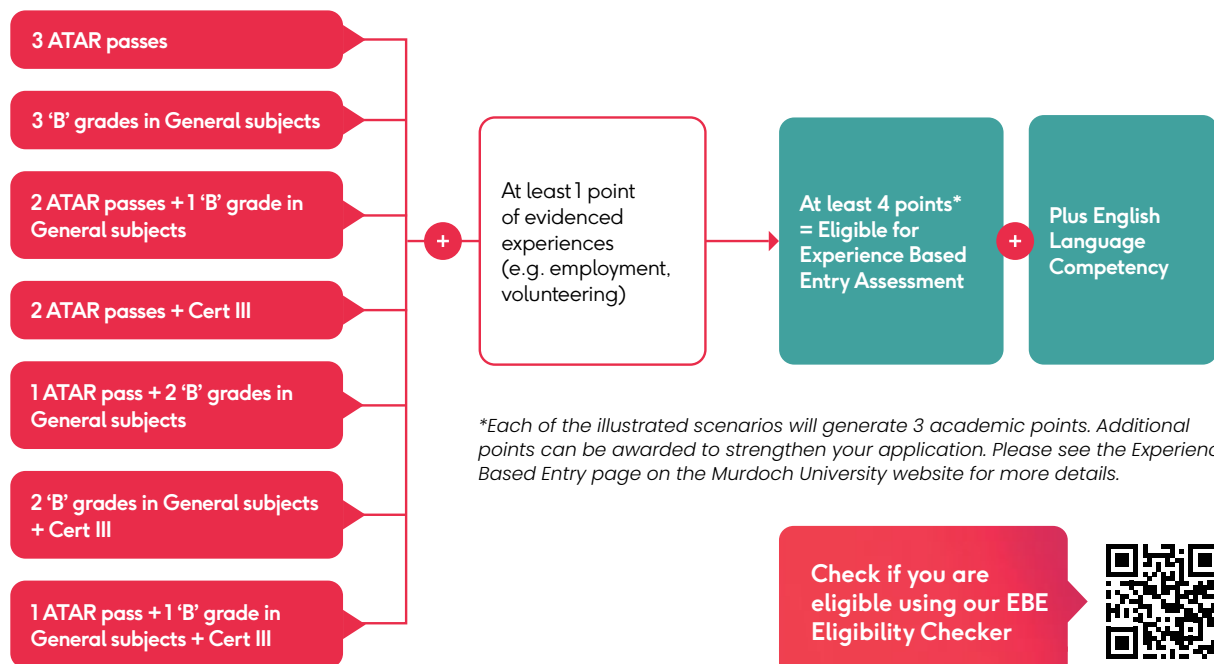
- Paid employment for 208+ hours in the previous 12 months,
- Unpaid work experience for 38+ hours in the previous 12 months,
- Unpaid sport coaching, umpiring, academic tutoring or mentoring for 40+ hours in the previous 12 months,
- Community participation or leadership (including volunteering) for at least 40 hours within the past 12 months. Hours may be cumulative across multiple activities and can include completion of The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award at Silver or Gold Level,
- Holding a position of active responsibility in a club, society or school student leadership e.g. prefect, student council, sports faction leader (or completed The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award Silver or Gold Levels in the previous 12 months).

Murdoch University is proud to partner with the Duke of Edinburgh in recognition of the valuable skills and qualities that so many young Australians have developed by achieving the award.

Extra points can be awarded if the hours are double the minimum requirement.

## Application requirements

To apply for Semester 1, apply via TISC. To apply for mid-year entry, apply direct to Murdoch University. When submitting your application, you'll need to include:

- Experience Based Entry reference template (see right).
- Supporting documents verifying any VET (TAFE/RTO) qualifications, university micro-credentials or university units.
- If you're a Western Australian student, your end of Year 11 and final Year 12 results will be available to our Admissions team via TISC. If you're applying from interstate, please include your secondary school subject results.
- If applying from July, mid-year Year 12 reports with subject grades may be uploaded for assessment.

## Mature age applicants

If secondary schooling was completed within the previous 5 years, you can utilise your Year 12 results to meet the academic requirements. Alternatively, if 5 years has elapsed since completing your secondary schooling, the following eligibility criteria can be used:

### Academic points

Mature age applicants will be required to attain a minimum of 3 points for academic attainment for their application to proceed. Points can be awarded for:

- Certificate IIIs that relate to the desired area of study will be awarded academic points.
- University micro credentials and/or a university level unit.

### Experience points

Mature age applicants will be required to attain at least 1 point for evidenced extracurricular/life experience. Points can be awarded for:

- Paid employment greater than 450 hours in an area related to the desired area of study in the previous 24 months.
- Cumulative unpaid work experience, community participation (including volunteer work) for greater than 150 hours in an area cognate to the desired area of study in the previous 24 months.

Extra points can be awarded if the hours are double the minimum requirement.

Mature age applicants may also want to consider the Mature Age Pathway (see page 15).

## Application requirements

# Media Portfolio Pathway

Creativity isn't confined to just one pathway, so why should you be? If you have the motivation to push creative boundaries but don't qualify for entry into an Arts, Communications or Creative Media course using your ATAR, your portfolio could get you there instead.



## Eligibility

Whether you're a school leaver or a non-school leaver, we encourage you to apply if you meet our eligibility criteria:

- Demonstration of English language competency through completion of two years of vocational education and training (VET through TAFE or a registered training organisation), or Years 11 and 12 at an Australian high school, or a combination of both.
- Demonstration of aptitude and ability via a portfolio of work relevant to the course you're applying for.

You will be assessed by the Academic Chair of your chosen course based on your creative portfolio and application, instead of your ATAR results.

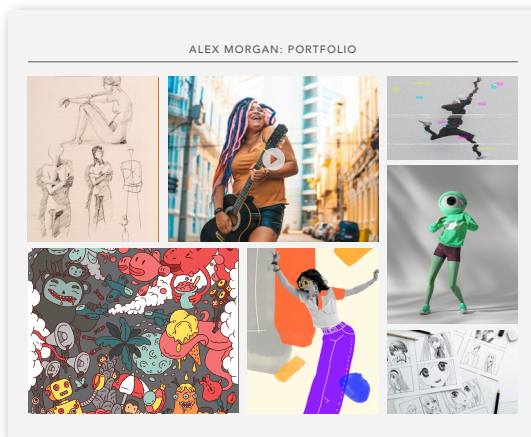

- You are allowed to use work you've completed at school (Visual Arts ATAR, Design ATAR, Certificates, etc.)
- Feel free to include additional work, but avoid overloading your portfolio
- For text-based submissions, keep your formatting simple and avoid fancy fonts

# Pathways to Veterinary Science

## Entry pathways

You may enter our Bachelor of Science/Doctor of Veterinary Medicine course through one of the following pathways:

### School Leaver Pathway

You can apply directly from secondary school. Your academic performance will be assessed using your ATAR or an equivalent qualification achieved within the last two years.

### Tertiary Pathway

If you have completed at least one year of full-time relevant university study in a natural science-based course, your application will be assessed based on your tertiary GPA.

### Waardong Pathway

If you are an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander applicant and do not gain entry through the above pathways, you may be considered through the Waardong Pathway. Selection is based on a holistic review of all your admission criteria. You can contact the Waardong team at [Waardong@murdoch.edu.au](mailto:Waardong@murdoch.edu.au) for admissions support through the First Choice for First Nations program.

## Minimum requirements

All applicants must meet the following minimum criteria to be eligible for admission:

- Completion of our application form for the current admission cycle and associated declarations.

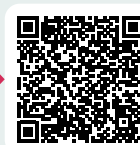
- Completion of the Casper Assessment. Casper is an open-response situational judgement test (SJT) that evaluates social intelligence and professionalism (for example, collaboration, equity, problem solving, empathy, ethics and self-awareness).

- Complete the asynchronous interview.

- Proof of English language proficiency requirements.

- Minimum academic performance (after any equity adjustment for domestic applicants):
  - >94 ATAR (or equivalent), or
  - tertiary GPA >2.5 (out of 4) or >5.5 (out of 7).

Applicants via the tertiary pathway must additionally meet the following criteria:

- Minimum of one week (35 hours) of veterinary-related experience, i.e. work experience with a veterinarian (this can be either paid or unpaid work but must be of clinical nature – observing surgery, diagnostics, and not of general animal experience). You must provide evidence of this on your application form.
- Minimum of 1 year (full-time equivalent) or 21 credit points (or equivalent) of tertiary study in a natural science-related course.
- Applicants via the school leaver pathway are **not** required to demonstrate veterinary related experience.

## Equity adjustments

If you are a domestic applicant and have experienced educational disadvantage, you may be eligible for equity adjustments to your academic performance score only before minimum requirements and Z-score rankings are determined. Non-academic criteria, including Casper and interview performance, are not adjusted.

Adjustments may apply if your academic performance has been affected by factors such as:

- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander status
- Disadvantaged socio-economic background
- Disability, medical condition or neurodiversity
- Carer responsibilities
- Difficult life circumstances
- Attendance at a disadvantaged or rural or remote secondary school (ATAR applicants only)

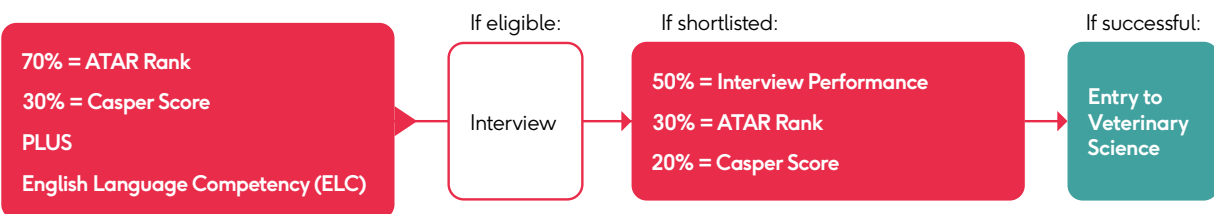
To be considered, you must indicate this on your TISC application, provide a statement describing the contextual factor and its impact on your academic performance, and submit supporting documentation.

Equity adjustments are scaled from 1 to 5 points depending on the number and impact of contextual factors. The maximum adjustments are:

- +5 ATAR points (or equivalent) for school leavers
- +0.5 GPA for tertiary applicants

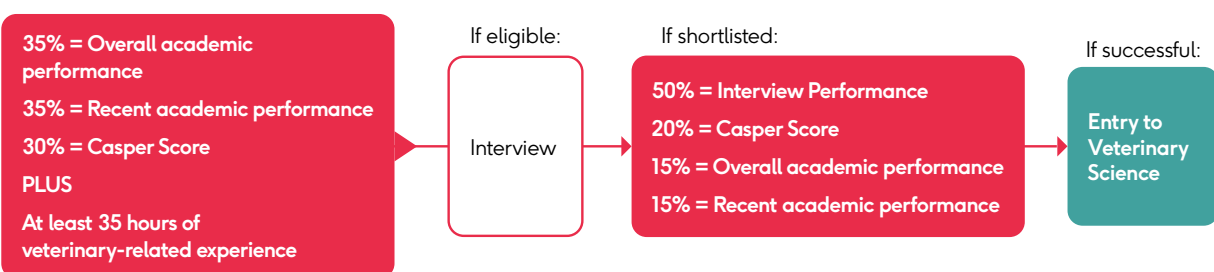

# Law Pathways

## Law Start (school leavers)

If you have achieved strong results in one or more ATAR subjects with a focus on essay writing and communication, you may be eligible to apply for Law Start, a direct entry pathway into a law or combined law degree at Murdoch University. Eligible subjects include English, English Literature, Modern History, Politics, and Legal Studies.

Law Start involves a half-day workshop with a written assessment. This assessment evaluates your readiness to study law and is used for admission instead of your overall ATAR score or selection rank.

If you successfully complete the workshop, achieve at least 65% in an eligible subject, maintain that grade through Year 12, and list a Law or combined Law degree as a preference on TISC, you may receive an offer to study Law at Murdoch University.

The workshop involves working in small groups on a first-year law tutorial problem, which forms the basis of a short written assessment.



### Pre-Law (school leavers and non-school leavers)

**Cost: \$750**

Pre-Law is designed to assess your current academic ability and give you the opportunity to show that you are ready to study law at Murdoch University. If you complete the course at Credit level, with a minimum average of 60%, you will be offered direct entry into the Bachelor of Laws.

Pre-Law combines online lectures with one evening per week of on-campus tutorials. The course runs over a full 14-week semester and has the same contact hours and workload as one first-year law unit.

#### The course includes:

- Three online lectures introducing the Australian legal system
- One online library tutorial and a library-based assessment
- Six online lectures covering substantive law, with a focus on Contract Law
- Eight face-to-face tutorials
- Two assessable projects
- A final exam

#### To be eligible for our Pre-Law program, you must:

- Be a domestic student
- Not be a current Murdoch University student
- Be an Australian citizen or hold permanent residency
- Meet our English Language Competency (ELC) requirements

## Student Services and Amenities Fee

The SSAF is charged twice per year, and the amount you pay depends on whether you're a full or part-time student, and which campus you study at. If you are eligible to defer, by completing a SA-HELP form with your Tax File Number by the relevant census date, your SSAF can be deferred to a HELP loan. 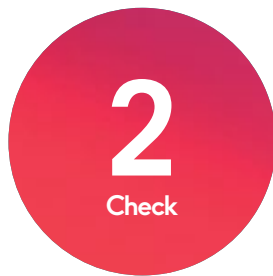

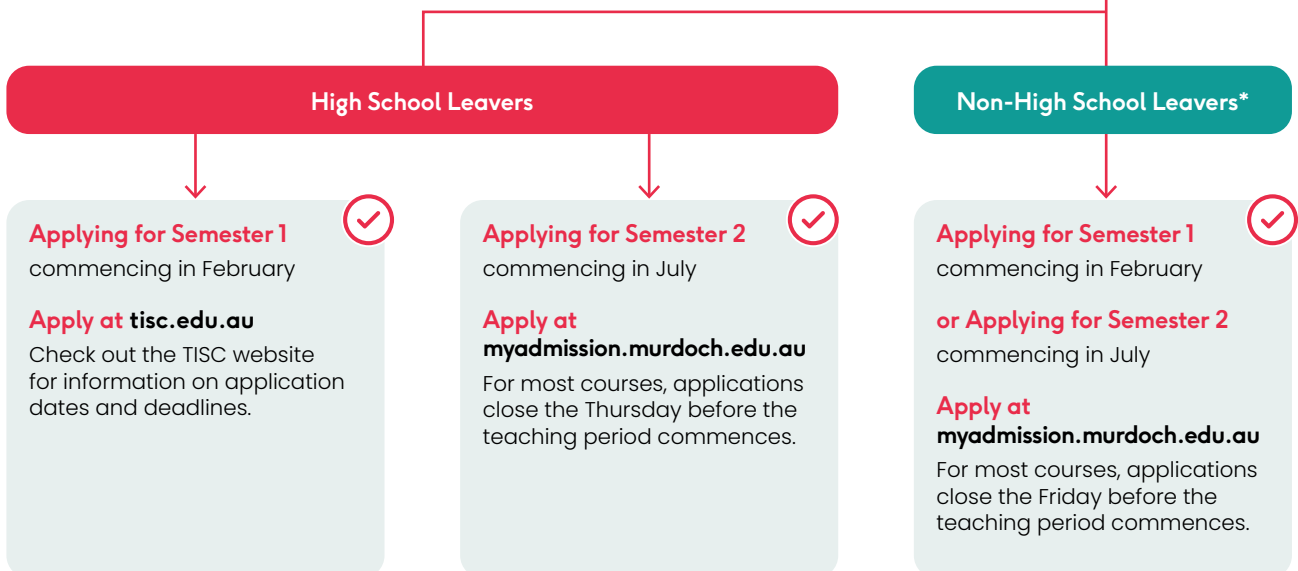
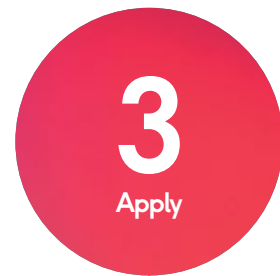
